Presiding Bishop sends letter to Secretary of State about eviction of Palestinian families

Episcopal Church Presiding Bishop Katharine Jefferts Schori sent a [letter](#) to U.S. Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton August 5 expressing sorrow over the Israeli government's August 2 eviction of two Palestinian families from East Jerusalem, and asked Clinton and the Obama administration to call for the families' immediate return.

"This action undermines the quest for peace led by you and President Obama and represents a step backward in the peace process and a likely precursor to further violence," Jefferts Schori wrote.

Despite U.S. pressure to freeze settlements in the West Bank and East Jerusalem, Israeli police August 2 evicted two Palestinian families living in East Jerusalem, and two Jewish families moved in, according to news reports.

Israel annexed East Jerusalem after the 1967 Six-Day War; it is considered occupied territory under international law. The city is home to 200,000 Jews and 250,000 Arabs.

The full text of the letter follows:

Dear Madam Secretary:

I write to join my voice to those of many others, lamenting the decision of the Israeli government to evict two Palestinian families from their homes in East Jerusalem on Sunday, 2 August. This action undermines the quest for peace led by you and President Obama and represents a step backward in the peace process and a likely precursor to further violence.

I appreciate your response that these evictions are "deeply regrettable" and that "the eviction of families and demolition of homes in East Jerusalem is not in keeping with Israeli obligations." I particularly appreciate your words that such action will not be "recognized as changing the status quo." I urge you and the Administration to build on these sentiments by calling unequivocally for the immediate return of the Palestinian families to their homes.

The United States government must not allow Israel to act with impunity. This does not serve the peace process, nor the long-term interests of the people of Israel. It certainly does not serve the cause of justice for Palestinians. No matter how many times the Israeli government may declare East Jerusalem to be part of Israel, under international law it remains occupied territory.

The Episcopal Church is firmly committed to policies that embrace Palestinian aspirations for a viable sovereign state, alongside a secure

state of Israel, with Jerusalem as the shared capital of both states. We continue to seek an end to the Israeli occupation while guaranteeing Israel's security and recognition of its right to exist. Our positions are based on resolutions adopted by our General Convention (The Episcopal Church's primary governing body). These resolutions also stand in opposition to the settlements built on Palestinian land, the building of the 'separation barrier' or wall where it violates Palestinian territory, and the demolition of Palestinian homes. Previous resolutions also call for an end to violence by all sides and a firm renunciation of anti-Semitism.

I deeply appreciate the determination of President Obama, who from the beginning of his Administration has sought a just resolution to this conflict. A successful resolution of the Israeli-Palestinian conflict will provide enormous dividends for peace in all of the Middle East, and lead to a more secure world. The appointment of George Mitchell as the Administration's special envoy has given renewed hope that this conflict may yet be resolved and the two peoples may be able to share this land with equal dignity, security, and freedom to build a more abundant life.

Meeting was called to order at 6:30 p.m. by Sr. Warden, Judy Downey. Nancy Wells led devotions.

Minutes from the June 10, 2009 Vestry meeting were approved as written. *Approved.*

Convocation Report: Doris Rolland shared notes from the meeting that was held at Grace on August 8th.

Old Business: Doris Rolland shared the progress regarding the columbarium. She has a plaque for Buddy Beyers for the wood work he did surrounding the niches. Her committee would like the Vestry to determine a price for the niches as we have persons interested in purchasing them. Final paperwork is being drafted and will be presented at the September vestry meeting. Fillmore Thomas is donating the replacement door for the area. The dedication will be scheduled in September. A motion was made that the vestry approve the cost of purchasing a niche at \$325 each for the Grace Episcopal Church Columbarium. This includes the price of the niche, urn, and engraving according to the rules and regulations set forth by the vestry and priest. Supported, *Approved.*

Nancy Wells reported there was a lack of interest in developing a Service Directory for congregation—so no further action will take place on it at this time. Nancy reported that Charlie Coutcher and she will be preparing a photo directory. The photos will be taken following services the last Sunday in September and first one in October.

The October vestry meeting will begin at 6:00 p.m. and follow with The Rev. Mark Engle, Consultant from 7-9 p.m. This allows enough time for business to be conducted. The groups will need to get together to proceed on action steps determined at the last meeting. Vestry members will organize this and be ready to work on at the September meeting.

New Business: Need to recruit additional delegates and alternates for the Convention which is held in October. Nancy Pearsall presented the Vestry with funeral luncheon updates and changes. While it isn't what we want; it has become necessary to look at charging a fee to provide a luncheon. The details will be presented in the next newsletter. The Vestry appreciates all the hard work and research Nancy put into this project. Dick West has received a quote from Holland Heating for furnace/ac maintenance. Is going to get one other to compare with current Porter & Heckman for next year. The thermostats are good ones, so they do not need to be replaced but are going to get programmed to help with heating/cooling costs. He is working on getting rid of the large frig in garage. Dick stated that the sexton position will need to be filled full time, so will be checking on filling that. Dick also presented information regarding a new gas supplier using Consumers Energy as payee. Motion to authorize signing up for this program, supported. *Approved.*

Finance Report: Lori presented the audit report received from the outside auditor. There were a few recommendations for both the church and ECW which will be implemented immediately. Motion to accept and approve the audit for 2008 as presented, supported. *Approved.*

Dave Coon, Treasurer presented the 2010 Tithe request for discussion. Motion to authorize acceptance of amount, supported. *Approved.*

Priest Comments: Fr. Boli stated he is "as happy as a pig in mud".

Other Business: There will be a church breakfast instead of picnic held on September 13th and will have only one service at 9:00 outside.

A request to survey the congregation regarding combining the hospitality hour or possible changes due to difficulty in getting volunteers.

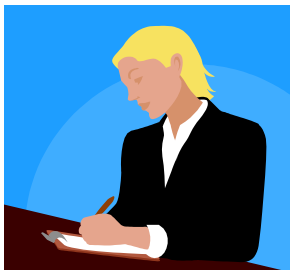
A group is working on getting a Lapeer County Community Foundation Grant to help fund a new stove to be used in the Food for Families program.

Thank you for your unrelenting work towards a just peace and please know that people of good will on both sides of this conflict share this goal with you for the benefit of the two peoples and three faiths that embrace the Holy Land.

WHO AM I? What I Believe.

(A report to help Grace church members know each other better.)

I was born in the congregational parsonage in Cheboygan, Wisconsin and my wife was born in the Methodist parsonage in St. Louis, MO. We both were children of ministers!

I attended preschool and school in Richmond, Wisconsin; and college in Beloit, the oldest college in Wisconsin, majoring in Economics.

After college I worked in Chicago three years for a wholesale lumber company. I was transferred to Flint, MI and called on lumber yards that could use lumber in carload quantities. I held accounts with GM for loading-crates and machine gun cases. I also sold lumber to trailer manufacturers. I decided to start business for myself and in 1941 started the Fillmore Thomas Co. in Lapeer. I retired after 66 years in the company.

In WWII, I taught naval pilots' ground school at St. Thomas College at St. Paul, Minn. Very enjoyable. I had earned ratings in civil aeronautics, airplane engines, navigation, aerodynamics, rules and regulations, meteorology, and use of parachutes. "I could do what I taught."

Married, we were blessed with two wonderful sons. We joined Grace Church about 1948 and I have been a member ever since. I served on the Vestry 18 years, was treasurer, 12; and was Jr. and Sr. Warden three years. My wife was choir director many years. We built a new home on Peppermill with an architect from the Frank L. Wright school of architecture. I supervised the building of the Grace Church hall utilizing the same architect. So, our church hall is built in the Frank L. Wright style. I met Frank L. Wright in 1934 where he spoke in Wisconsin, and I escorted him to his car. More recently, I donated replacement windows for the hall, the kitchen, and replaced the roof at Grace. I have pledged an outside door for the newly installed Columbarium—Meditation room.

Besides seeing in person F.L. Wright, another highlight of my life was in 1932, hearing in person Franklin D. Roosevelt, Herbert Hoover, and Norman Thomas campaigning for president. By the way, Norman Thomas was the best speaker.

What I believe? I believe in doing the right thing at all times. I've had many disappointments in my life, but they have given me new opportunities to do the right thing. Doing the right thing works all the time.

Flint River Valley Convocation Report

Dean Bedford opened the meeting at 9:10 am and led prayer which centered on the meaning of the words I AM from John.

The minutes of the previous meeting were corrected to say there is no individual discreet training for mutual ministry teams.

The treasurer stated the convocation will stay with the Raymond James Corp. which will cost \$100 a year with no charge for writing checks. Every report is made on-line. Interest of \$10 was received in June. Balance on hand: \$15,483. Congregational donations are holding up, \$30,750 was budgeted for the year. We have received 75% to date.

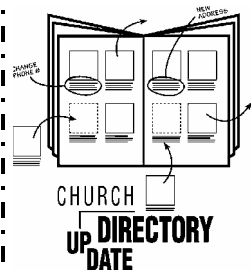
Clerical Dean, Marti Fields reported that the secular press has no idea about the long term effects of what's happening in the Church. If you want accurate info about what occurred at the Triennial Convention, listen to the deputies attending. "Integrity" on Face Book reports well. "The church is in the process of gathering all info about same sex relations. All church marriage records are kept by the church for the state. The church should be out of civil marriages. Only if you want sacramental marriage do you go to the church. The National Church cut their budget drastically. Presently, congregational donations are divided 40/60 between the convocation and diocese. The convocation voted to keep the split as is.

The Episcopal Church is established in 18 countries. Fr. Field said we should keep in mind that when a person visits our church, they make up their mind in the first five minutes if they want to stay. It is every Christian's responsibility to invite people to church. "Most people are looking for belonging and not belief."

Dean Bedford asked the reps to put out a call for someone with financial savvy to run for standing committee. Nominations are due now. The Convention is the third week in October. Parish updates were given from St. Christopher, Gr. Blanc; St. Pauls, Corunna; St. Andrews, Flint; St. Dunstons, Davison; Trinity, Flushing; St. Pauls, Flint and Grace Church, Lapeer.

The meeting was adjourned with prayer at 11:30.

“Build on the Past ... Grow in the Present” by Garnet Haase

Deep blue skies dotted with cotton candy clouds delight us during September. Cool nights make it easier to sleep and warm days let us enjoy the summer’s passing. Marching bands fill the air with stirring music on Friday nights, while cross-town rivals battle for gridiron supremacy. Students return to school for another nine months of academic challenges. At church, we kick off another year of programs, activities and events.

September is a month of fresh starts. No matter what happened in the previous years, we can have the renewed hope that things will be different, even better, this year. New teachers, new subjects, new opportunities for learning and growing await the student each September. Pupils must build upon past experiences while moving ahead to embrace additional information and insights — for refusing to work at their new courses leads to failure.

The same is true in other areas of our lives. Though the past is important, we must continue to learn and grow *today* and on into the future. Are we ready for God to guide us through a year of adventure or are we going to succumb to our fears and stagnate? Are we willing to embrace the growth in ourselves and others or will we insist everyone must stay in the pigeon holes we’ve assigned them in our minds?

We wouldn’t like it if our children refused to study and learn new material at school. So how can we expect God to like it when we refuse to forgive one another and move beyond our hurts and heartaches? While we’re reveling in the beauty of this September’s brilliant blue skies and smiling as band music fills the crisp night air, let’s allow Christ to teach us how to build on the good we’ve learned in the past, while moving ahead to the fresh starts he has in store for us.

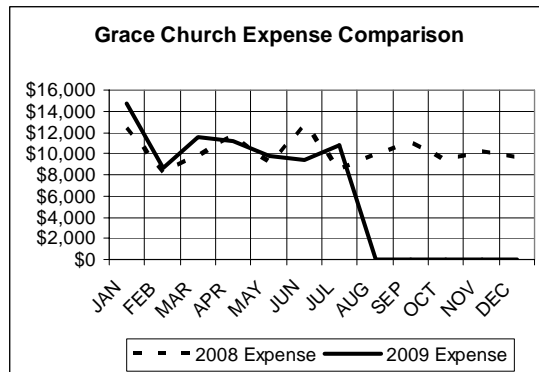
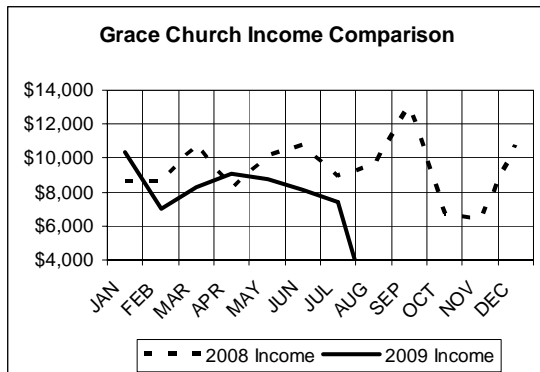

It has become evident that the difficult economic times have also greatly affected our ability to provide the quality luncheons that we have in the past. We are few, but mighty, but all of us are feeling the burden of providing food not only for our own families, but to help others.

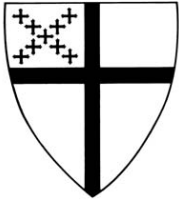
